PRESENTER NAME(S): Janet Head, Elizabeth Head, & Rhonda Head
WORKSHOP DESCRIPTION:
Residential School continues to impact the children today. Intergenerational Residential School Survivors are waking up to what happened to their parents, grandparents and great grandparents. Just to name a few, the impacts are loss of language, loss of culture, loss of identity, loss of parenting and loss of caring for ourselves. With Intergenerational Residential School Survivors sharing their story how to overcome challenges and complex trauma, using PowerPoint presentation, the participants will have visuals and handouts. What were the impacts? How did the impacts shape us? How did it affect our relationships with each other? How did it impact our growth? The 12-Step Program for Intergenerational Residential School Survivors will be included. An exercise for participants to compliment/empower each other will also be included. It takes practice to compliment. It takes practice to receive compliments. Part of the Seven Sacred Teachings was to show our people how to be good human beings. This was lost along the way from Residential School. The cycle of life was fractured. Bringing back our sacredness is part of reconciliation and healing.

Indigenous people were stripped of their culture, age grade teachings, rites of passage and ceremonies that kept them in balance. Today, many of our Indian Residential School (IRS) survivors do not know their roles, therefore, it is difficult for them to offer guidance in their communities.
A brief overview of our cultural practices will help understand the detrimental impact of both the residential schools and child welfare policies on the lifestyles of Indigenous people today. Reconciliation can be achieved by restoring our traditional ways of life. This full day workshop will include the following areas: Tobacco offerings; What is traditional life skills?; The story of our first smudge (where was it found; what was is used for; different kinds of smudge); Childhood ceremonies (placenta/belly button ceremony; traditional names; moss bag teachings); Youth ceremonies (rites of passage; vision quests/fasting; the role of the helper); Adult ceremonies (traditional male and female roles; marriage; cultural practices); Elder Stage (the definition of an Elder and their rite of passage; the role of an Elder); The Passage Home-our journey to the other side; and ceremonialists.

The steps and approaches that would lead to reconciliation, self-direction and empowerment will be explored and shared by the workshop facilitators and participants.
